Website

Social Science Data Bases

Faculty, staff, and students on campuses that subscribe to the social science data bases have access to these data bases.¹ The SSRIC provides assistance to all CSU faculty, staff, and students in accessing the information in these data bases. (See our <u>website</u> under "Data" for more information.)

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The Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research at the University of Michigan is the closest we have to a national social science data archive in the United States. It is a consortium of nearly 800 member-institutions, which include virtually every major university and college in the United States and Canada and many universities throughout the world. The ICPSR data holdings serve a broad spectrum of disciplines including political science, sociology, history, economics, geography, demography, gerontology, public health, criminal justice, education, international relations, business, and education. Currently the ICPSR's archive includes over 15,000 studies including the General Social Survey, the American National Election Studies, U.S. Census data from 1790 to the present, the World Values Survey, Current Population Surveys, the Panel Study of Income Dynamics, U.S. election returns from 1788 to the present, the Monitoring the Future surveys, the National Survey on Drug Abuse, and the National Crime Victimization surveys. The consolidation of membership in these data archives, facilitated by the SSRIC, represents a considerable savings of almost \$30,000 to the CSU campuses over what it would have cost for campuses to join individually.

CALSPEAKS Data

The SSRIC has historically partnered with CALSPEAKS, a survey of California public opinion housed at Sacramento State.

In early 2024, we were informed that the CALSPEAKS survey would be ending. They will be maintaining an archive of past survey results that should continue to be accessible. To explore the past survey results, see <u>https://scholarworks.calstate.edu/collections/8s45qc545</u>

SSRIC SEED GRANT Award

Following the ending of the CALSPEAKS survey, the SSRIC created the SSRIC SEED GRANTs. These grants will fund activities that support the submission of larger external grant proposals, aligned with SSRIC's mission and vision in the social sciences. The Seed Grant will fund the following for faculty who receive the award:

- 3 WTUs of reassigned time (paid by the Chancellor's Office to the awardee's campus)
- A hired research mentor, retained by SSRIC, who has experience with successful grant writing with NSF (some potential research mentors have even been program directors at NSF)

• A stipend (\$500) upon successful submission of the NSF grant proposal Applicants must be full-time tenured/tenure-track faculty appointed in a social science-related discipline/department (sociology, political science, anthropology, public health, economics, psychology, business, and others that are strictly social science by reasonable

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determination of SSRIC) AND the project proposed must be social science, subject to the sole and final determination of the SSRIC SEED GRANT award committee

Social Science Student Symposium (S⁴)

<u>The 50th Annual CSU SSRIC Social Science Student Symposium</u> (S⁴) will be hosted by CSU Dominguez on Thursday, May 1, 2025. Undergraduate and graduate students can present their work in a non-threatening environment. For many students, this is their first opportunity to present their work at a professional conference. Although there are awards, the conference is low key with the intention of offering students an opportunity to present their social science research in a supportive environment.

In 2024, the SSRIC hosted its 49th annual student research conference hosted by CSU Sacramento State University on May 2, 2024. The following students were presented with awards:

- The Charles McCall Award for Best Undergraduate Papers:

- The Award for the Best Paper Using Qualitative Methods

 - Honorable Mention: Sam Minard, Sociology, Monterey Bay, "Climate Migration in the United States: The Influence of Natural Disasters, Resource Scarcity, and Perceived Climate Inhospitality."

Thanks to the continuing generosity of Dr. Gene Geisler, Professor Emeritus of Political Science at San Francisco State and a key founding member of the SSRIC, the 2025 Symposium will include cash awards for the best papers (i.e., best undergraduate paper, best graduate paper, best paper using quantitative data, best paper using qualitative data). Eligibility for awards is limited to CSU undergraduates and Master's level graduate students, and students in the first two full years of a CSU doctoral program including recent graduates (Spring term 2024 or later) presenting work completed prior to graduation.

Please encourage your students to present their research at the conference. If they would like to compete for the awards, they must submit their complete paper. If they want to present their research and not compete for the awards, they only need to submit an abstract. **Registration is open through March 30, 2025**. Teaching Resources

Instructional materials, including short exercises and longer modules with introductions to many methodological and statistical topics, **are now available via our new Canvas page. To join the page and gain access to these resources**, <u>click here</u>. They will include exercises focusing on longitudinal analysis, statistics, research methods, critical thinking, economics, social issues, religion, tolerance, abortion, gender differences, confidence in societal institutions, spending priorities, and guns.

Some exercises worth noting:

- A new set of exercises on the SSRIC website *Regression Modeling in Social Sciences Using GSS* – This set of instructional materials offers eight modules, each of them containing a (1) Rscript file and a (2) lab exercise to demonstrate regression modeling in social sciences. The activities employ the General Social Survey (GSS-2018) using RStudio. After completing the modules, students will be able to run and interpret multiple linear regression and logistic regression analysis.
- Another new resource on the SSRIC website *Introduction to Human Geography* This resource is a manual, with accompanying YouTube video tutorials, meets a need for a free collection of exercises for students enrolled in Introduction to Human Geography (and faculty teaching it), using real world data. Topics include crime mapping, demography and segregation, food and fitness, and retail site location. Exercises include work with ArcGIS 10.8 and/or ArcGIS Pro.—

Programs for Statistical Analysis

Along those same lines, it is worth noting that there are several commonly used statistical packages widely used in the CSU.

- Survey Documentation and Analysis (SDA). SDA is an online statistical package written by the Survey Methods Program at UC Berkeley that allows online data analysis, including frequencies, comparison of means, crosstabulations, comparison of means, correlation and regression, and logistic regression. A new release of SDA is now available. A list of SDA resources will be available on the SSRIC's new website.
- Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) is the most commonly used statistical package in the CSU. The CSU has a systemwide site license for SPSS which allows faculty and staff (but not students) to have SPSS installed on their computers and in computer labs. There is also an online textbook that will be available on our new website which serves as an introduction to SPSS.
- PSPP. A free alternative to SPSS, created by the *Free Software Foundation*. We've prepared a tutorial for this package (This is in process of being moved over to the new website).

Instructional Materials Wanted

SSRIC seeks CSU faculty to submit proposals in creating instructional exercises that will be posted on the SSRIC website. Upon successful completion of the process, recipients will be awarded \$3,000 each for their submission of acceptable exercises. Potential applicants are

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encouraged to see existing exercises <u>here</u>. Additionally, this year we are accepting proposals from previous awardees to revise existing materials. The call for proposals has gone out to members of our mailing list (email: <u>ssric@calstate.edu</u> to be added) and is **due March 21, 2025.**

SSRIC Stipends Available for ICPSR Summer Program

This year the CSU's Social Science Research and Instructional Council (SSRIC) is once more offering stipends for CSU faculty members to register for quantitative methods courses in the 2025 Summer Program presented by the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR).
